- This is about life in the Kingdom; it is meant for disciples vv1-2 cf. Matt 28:19-20
- Behaviour and Character

2. v3 - "Blessed are the poor in spirit ..."

- 'Poor' might be better translated as 'destitute'
- Only when we are that kind of poor in spirit, do we surrender everything then Jesus is King

3. v4 - "Blessed are those who mourn ..."

- Deeper than bereavement
- Biblical comfort cf. Isaiah 40:1-3; 61:1-3; Rev 7:17. Who are the ones who will be comforted in this way?
- Sorrow over _____

PURE AND PEACEMAKERS

Bible passage

8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

9 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

- Matthew 5:8-9 NIV

Notes:

- Certain characteristics make up for a good quality life.
- The Beatitudes show us what characteristics make for a blessed life in God's eyes and in His kingdom
- "Pure in heart" means a single-mindedness on the kingdom and inner moral purity.
- "Peacemakers" are not just people who are peaceful. They are 'shalom' makers.
- Jesus' followers are blessed because God reveals His kingdom through them.
- We often think the quality of our life is determined by what happens to us. Jesus taught that the quality of our life is determined by what happens inside us.

Application:

Let's ask God to change our hearts so that we can face the situation. What situation or who in your life needs the peace of Christ that Jesus has given you?

The Bottom Line:

Our quality of life depends on our heart condition and relationship status.

10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. **11** Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. **12** Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

- Matthew 5:10-12 NIV

Introduction: Persecution has existed all through the ages, and even still.

The Reality:

- Eighth and final beatitude brings us full circle ... "theirs is the kingdom"
- As a follower of Jesus, persecution will happen to you (v. 11)

BEATITUDES ENCOURAGEMENT AND A WARNING

SUNDAY 31 JANUARY 2021 | PASTOR CLEM FUNG

Bible passage

20 Looking at his disciples, he said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. **21** Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied. Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh. **22** Blessed are you when people hate you, when they exclude you and insult you and reject your name as evil, because of the Son of Man. **23** Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven. For that is how their ancestors treated the prophets. **24** But woe to you who are rich, for you have already received your comfort. **25** Woe to you who are well fed now, for you will go hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you will mourn and weep. **26** Woe to you when everyone speaks well of you, for that is how their ancestors treated the false prophets." - **Luke 6:20-26 NIV**

Introduction: There is theological emphasis in Luke's account of the Beatitudes that is different from Matthew's account.

1. What's similar?

- Jesus welcomes and ministers to everyone
- This teaching however is meant for disciples
- Kingdom is not what most people would expect or desire
- If you follow Jesus, expect persecution

2. What's different/unique?

- There is a 'higher' call; you cannot stay shallow
- Jesus is speaking to you
- Personal internal character is the emphasis of Matthew's Beatitudes
- Luke's Beatitudes emphasise social external circumstances
- Very stern warning in good times

3. What it means

- Two kinds of people
- Two different times
- There will be a reversal and overturning of fortunes

4. Implication and application

- Warning: Our very real danger
- How do your circumstances affect you?

Discussion questions.

1. Wealth, health, and happiness ... How do these things (and the pursuit of them) help or hinder your faith?

2. Jesus gives very stern warning to those who are comfortable, have an abundance of things, and 'buy in' to the world. Does this apply to you? Why or why not?

3. How else is the Lord speaking to you today?
